NOSOTROS MEANS US

Imitation and Symbolic Representation

This book features a mother and child who imagine transforming into different versions of themselves over time. It lends itself to showing symbolic representation of the idea of parent and child, as well as growing up.

TEACHING TIP

THINK

Symbolic representation revolves around the idea that images and actions can represent ideas and processes. Young children begin to practice imitation themselves as they begin to understand real world ideas through play. Engaging and supporting in pretend play supports children's development of imitation and symbolic thought. Children practice imitating ideas through pretend roles and think more deeply about an idea by using one object to stand for another. Modeling roleplay, labeling symbols, and encouraging the use of props are all ways to further support this skill.

1. INTRODUCE

"What sort of sound does a sheep make? (Model a sheep sound). What about a bear? (Model a bear sound).
 Today we're going to read Nosotros Means Us. We'll see a mother and a child act like different animals together.
 They have different ways of showing that they are always mom and child."

2. READ THE BOOK

- Pause occasionally to narrate the imitation and representation of both the mother and child.
- Label the symbol of each animal when they show mother or child.

3. REVIEW

• "The mother and child pretended to be animals together. They pretended to be the same kind of animal until the child grew up, and then they pretended they were different types of animals."

4. KEEP IT GOING

Incorporate pretend play opportunities throughout the room. Provide materials that allow children to imitate
actions, such as baby dolls and bottles, and open-ended materials that allow children to symbolize ideas, such as
using a box as a car.
